First meeting as freshmen in high school, and now in our 90s, my friend and I enjoy a lengthy telephone visit at least once a week. I recently had my hair permed and our conversation turned to what we endured as young girls in the attempt to look beautiful. Not too fondly, we recalled the torture of the curling iron. It resembled the hair tools of today, but instead of an electric cord had handles. The kerosene lamp was lighted, the curling iron was placed down in the lamp chimney to heat; the handles rested on the rim. I held a serving spoon with a rounded bowl over my ear for protection while Mom curled my hair. Though my mother was very careful, I still got branded occasionally, voicing my discomfort with loud yowls of pain. She didn't give me much sympathy, just reminded me in her sweet, calm voice, "Well, you know it hurts to be pretty."




Using long strips of cloth to form curls was a much safer alternative to the branding iron. The disadvantage was sleeping on them all night. Each curl required a 1½ inch wide strip torn from an old sheet or dish towel. Leaving a few inches above the scalp it was spiraled down and around a hank of hair from top to bottom, then spiraled back up. The two ends were then tied at the top. By morning my unnaturally straight blond locks had been transformed into curls that could be left intact or combed into waves.

Circa 1939 Mr. & Mrs. Charles Guy opened a barber and beauty shop on lower Main Street in Elk Horn. That is where I had my introduction to permanent waves and the Rube Goldberg type contraptions that created long-lasting curls. Strands of hair were wrapped around rods much like in present times. Then the contraption from outer space was brought over on a tall pole. It had long electric cords ending with grippers attached to a ring around the top. These were brought down, one by one and attached to the wrapped rods on my head. It rather resembled an inverted milking machine but produced heat instead of suction. I had no idea at the time that the entire machine was plugged into an electric outlet or I might have vacated that chair before I ever sat down. As the rods heated up, the head did also. But the beautician stood near-by, equipped with a large rubber syringe with a long snout. If you pointed to a hot spot, she immediately gave it a couple blasts of cool air to lower the heat. Eventually hot perms gave way to cooler versions. For a while home-perms purchased over-the-counter were quite the rage.

For day-to-day hair care, curlers ranged through the years from metal rollers to plastic, brush, foam, etc. Pin-curling was a fad of the 40s. A hank of hair was twisted around your index finger and held in place with 1 or 2 bobby-pins. If you had an evening out planned you came to school with your hair in pin curls wrapped with a scarf tied on the top of your head. That custom came to an abrupt halt when the superintendent decreed curlers and pin curls would no longer be allowed during school time. This was before personal hair-dryers, hair spray and gels we arrived in our area. Rainy, muggy days posed major problems for most feminine scholars, but we did look much more civilized with our hair combed. Hair styles through my lifetime were numerous and included the Shirley Temple Ringlets, waves formed by finger, using lots of gooey wave-set. There were the skater Dorothy Hamill Wedge, Page Boy, French Roll, Upward Trend, French Braids and more. Perhaps the most unusual was the Beehive, a hair-do that featured coiling the hair around the head as high as possible. The accompanying, quite accurate illustration is from a birthday card I received after my encounter with a swarm of bees. (The bee story is for another time.)

Standard 1940s apparel for high school girls included jeans and a white tee shirt when we weren't clad in a dress or skirt and blouse. Jeans had to be rolled to just mid-calf, no higher, no lower. Footwear was standard: Saddle shoes and bobby-sox. It was the era of flaming red lipstick and we teen-age girls slathered it on generously when out of sight of our parents. I didn't know it then but wearing red lipstick during the WWII years was considered an act of patriotism. It symbolized victory, optimism and impacted morale, worn as an act of defiance because Adolph Hitler supposedly hated red lipstick. It was mandatory for female Marines during the war and a lipstick called Montezuma Red was created for their use. It represented the U.S. flag and symbolized strength.

A lifetime passed and with it every imaginable hair style. My mother, with her very tender head, became the one who winced at every little pain as I became the hair-fixer and she became the victim. Though I tried to be very gentle I empathized with her discomfort. But she always managed a smile when I reminded her, "Well, Mom, you know how it hurts to be pretty."



**YES, THERE IS GOOD NEWS!**

Picking up from where we left off in our previous article, let us consider the topic of 'the worship of God'. Of all the topics we might study, this one should cause us to bow down before our mighty Creator. This topic should be foremost in our hearts.

There are many examples in the scriptures that tell us of worship: King Solomon built a great temple unto God. His father King David wanted to build this temple but as a warrior, his hands were stained with blood; He was not considered holy enough to take on that task. Chapters 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of 2 Chronicles tell us the beautiful story of this endeavor and it is quite worthy of your time to read them – let me share with you a short but significant portion of that episode. The temple had been completed, the entire assembly of Israel was gathered around. Solomon blessed the people, and he gave a prayer of dedication and then we read, "As soon as Solomon finished his prayer, fire came down from heaven and consumed the burnt offering and the sacrifices, and the glory of the LORD filled the temple. And the priests could not enter the house of the LORD, because the glory of the LORD filled the LORD's house. When all the people of Israel saw the fire come down and the glory of the LORD over the temple, they bowed down with their faces to the ground on the pavement and worshiped and gave thanks to the LORD, saying, 'For he is good, for his loving kindness endures forever.'"

I think the part of that activity that gets to me the most is where the glory of God fills the temple and not even the priests could enter!! Wow, what an amazing event. And then, yes, the people worshiped. I really believe that today, in our 21st century society, we who claim to be Christians, do not really understand just what the holiness of God constitutes. We don't get it. And most of us don't even care.

King David, at the end of one of his Psalms of prayer, which is given to us in the book of 1 Chronicles 29:20, says this, "Praise the LORD your God. So all the people praised the LORD, the God of their fathers; they bowed low and fell prostrate before the LORD and the king." The things David said leading up to this worship event, hit the people in their heart.

I mentioned in the previous article that God has provided the prescription for His people to worship Him. How much of that do we consider today? I really believe we are watered down worshipers. "We honor God with our lips but our hearts are far from Him. Our worship of God is made up only of rules made by men"! (Is. 29:13)

Have you ever felt that your worship of God is missing something? Or maybe to be quite honest, it is missing everything.

Let us spend some time in the next few weeks, considering not how we want to worship God but how He tells us we are to worship Him. Our God is a holy God; or as the Seraphim say in Isaiah chapter 6:3 "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD Almighty; the whole earth is full of His glory." Three times holy – a superlative comment.

**IT'S ONLY SCIENCE**

Small towns and rural areas are going to pose a different set of problems with going to electric vehicles than the cities will be facing. When you look at cities, they have most goods and services within their corporate limits. This is not the case with smaller towns and rural areas.

As the population dwindled in the rural areas the small towns had to create strategies in order to remain viable. They realized that they could not support all of the needed goods and services for their residents. Thus the strategy of survival became to provide goods and services that the nearby towns did not have. And those towns followed the same ideas and worked to keep their businesses without nearby competition healthy. So, one town might have a clinic, but another might have an auto repair business. And still another a beauty salon or a body shop. By avoiding direct competition with other businesses nearby all of them had sufficient customer support to remain viable.

This does pose a different set of problems and perhaps will require some unique solutions as we move to electric vehicles. The start of a nationwide system of level 3 charging stations is underway. But this likely will be along major highway routes or in population centers. These level 3 charging systems are more expensive than many small businesses or tourist attractions could afford to install. And they require heavier and higher voltage service than is available in many parts of small towns.

This is where the problems differ from the cityscape. Small town and rural residents must regularly visit other small towns and rural areas in order to fulfill our needs. The population density is lower than that which would make public transportation viable. We are going to have to come up with answers to this problem. Whether this is delivery services added by some businesses, or by having some sort of communal vehicle available, or creating a tier two transportation infrastructure remains to be seen. After all, a fresh style and set or perm is not something that can be delivered. The less expensive level 2 charging systems will need to become a fixture in small towns. Since these take a considerable amount of time to deliver a meaningful charge, do we need to have other services at their locations? Perhaps E-bikes or golf carts to rent. Allowing our visitors, a means to explore and shop our attractions and businesses while their vehicle gets charged up.

It is time to begin developing solutions to these problems or our warm, friendly, and welcoming small-town Iowa will suffer even greater declines in population.

### JERRY HOFFMAN

In 1986 when 17-year-old Jerry signed up for the National Guard during the summer following his junior year in high school, he is positive the recruiter didn't mention anything about snakes. Yet Fort Benning, Georgia appeared to have about as many poisonous snakes as it did military trainees. Take your pick—in the swamps and red clay soil there were timber rattlers, cottonmouths, water moccasins, and coral snakes. Although the little coral snakes were the

most poisonous with a venom comparable to the king cobra, they were also a very shy snake. It was the aggressive water moccasins that caused the most worry. To a young soldier those snakes were an added lesson in the importance of paying very close attention to all the surroundings, a skill especially important for an infantryman.

A group of recruits from various locations in Iowa, plus a few from other areas of the U. S., ended up working together throughout Basic. Jerry quickly realized the Iowans all shared a common Midwest work ethic. As Basic continued several of the recruits from other states didn't make it and were mustered out. None of the Iowans washed out. The Iowa recruits took training seriously and earned almost all the awards. It was the physical requirements that most often caused problems.

In AIT (Advanced Individual Training) Jerry trained as an infantryman (a "ground pounder"). Although Jerry very modestly referred to himself as "just an infantryman," common knowledge lets us know how vital those infantrymen are. During a 17-mile march he stumbled and broke his foot. At the time, no one realized it was broken. With about 3 or 4 miles yet to go, the instructor encouraged him to keep hiking. When the doctor later examined the foot and Jerry returned to the barracks with his foot in a cast, the instructor was very apologetic. He ended up being temporarily pulled from AIT to allow the foot to heal. During the healing time, he had an office job and got to know and appreciate the kinder side of his drill instructor. He finished AIT with a later set of recruits.

Jerry spent six years in active National Guard service. His unit spent weekends continuing to keep skills sharp. Quite a lot of time was spent in map reading and marksmanship practice. He discovered that he was right-handed and left-eye dominant, an unusual and added advantage for being a good marksman. The medical training he received during those weekend maneuvers prepared him to step right into his position as a volunteer for the Elk Horn Fire & Rescue Team in 1998.




At the end of his six years of active duty and his two years of reserve, Jerry seriously considered reenlisting. His father had been an Army infantryman in Vietnam and had seen an extremely tragic side of war. Many of the active military were now being called to serve in the Middle East conflicts. Jerry's father strongly opposed a reenlistment. He honored his father's wish and followed his advice.

Jerry has three people that he wants to honor and pay tribute to — his father, his mother, and a military buddy. Father — Thomas Hoffman: injured twice, was awarded a purple heart, a bronze star, and the South Vietnam Award for Bravery. Mother — Phyllis (Schmidt) Hoffman: a Marine stationed in California who worked in shipping and supply. Military buddy — George Duma, Jr: George had some rough experiences in life and found the military to be a real home. After he finished his National Guard years, he enlisted in the Army and continued to give service to our country. While on a training mission, George and another soldier were killed. Jerry remembers all three with great respect.

## Elk Horn Lutheran Church Food Pantry



## City of Elk Horn

### Important Ordinances for Residents: For a full and complete copy of the ordinance please contact the City Clerk:

- **Animals:** All cats & dogs are required to be registered through the city. A \$20.00 lifetime fee can be paid to the City Clerk. No household shall have more than two (2) dogs and two (2) cats over the age of six months of age. A maximum of 6 chickens (hens only) shall be in a side or rear yard only.

All animals need to be leashed or in a confined secured area while outdoors.

- **Building Permit:** No structure shall be erected, reconstructed, altered, or added to without first securing a permit from the City Council (fences included). Permit fee of \$100.00 for any project cost up to \$10,000. The permit fee for any project over \$10,000 shall be 1% of the total project cost. Applications can be picked up from the City Clerk's office.

- **Snow:** After deposit of accumulation, Commercial properties have 8 hours to clear sidewalks of ice and snow, Residential properties have 24 hours to clear sidewalks of ice and snow. The mayor may have the natural accumulations of snow or ice removed without notice to the property owner and fees assessed against the property's taxes. Please move vehicles off the street when staff is clearing streets.

- **Grass:** DO NOT blow grass into the roadways as it causes blockage in our storm drains.

- **Trees:** The owner shall keep the trees on, or overhanging the street, trimmed so that all branches will be at least fifteen (15) feet above the surface of the street and eight ( 8 ) feet above sidewalks.

- **Fireworks:** Any person discharging fireworks assumes all responsibility for its operation, flight, and the consequences thereof. It shall be unlawful to discharge fireworks at all times the City's fire danger warning is categorized as "High" or "Extreme:


Dates and hours allowed:

\*July 1st through July 8th 12:00PM to 10:00PM, except July 4th, hours shall be from 12:00PM to 11:00PM. \*December 29th through January 1st 12:00PM to 10:00PM, except December 31st, hours shall be from 12:00PM until January 1st at 12:30AM.

- **Swimming Pools:** No swimming pools shall be filled with water or be put into use prior to inspection and approval by the city. Any pool greater than 24 inches deep shall be equipped with a 6-foot fence with an automatic closing and latching device installed 4 feet above the ground. Property owner must submit their insurance company information for the city to verify all requirements are met prior the use of a private pool.

- **Parking:** Personal vehicles include cars, vans, sport utility vehicles, pickup trucks, campers, boats, and boat trailers may not be parked on the grass. Parking is permitted on an all-weather driveway (defined as either paved, gravel or stone) only.

## News From The Mill




Trouble struck the windmill the week of 3/13 when Bill Rollins noticed an issue with the fantail. One of the gear boxes appears to have failed, causing a break in the main shaft that facilitates the transfer of movement between the fantail and the windmill's cap. This prevents the windmill from turning into the wind on its own and it will have to be monitored closely until

We also want to thank Mike and Lisa Riggs for their proactive help in keeping the windmill facing into the wind. We are all working to fix the issue as soon as possible. The windmill will remain open for tours, but access to the catwalk for the time being is restricted.

As always, we are proud of the community support we have received. We are happy to announce that the Mill has received a grant from the Shelby County Community Foundation to help update our restrooms and finish the ongoing breakroom projects for our employees and volunteers. The funds will be used to upgrade all of our toilets and obtain a suite of cabinets for the breakroom kitchenette. Jacksonville Hardware will be making the improvements. With so many important projects in need of our attention, it will be a large relief to take these off the list. Thank you all for helping us make the upgrades we need.

Our first Spring Windmill Gala and Charity Auction is just around the corner! If you haven't bought tickets yet, there is still time to get in on a great event. Join us on April 2nd at 11:30 for some great food and a lively auction of unique items. 





A word from the Clerk,  
Greetings!

I just wanted to reach out to our Residents and Patrons of Elk Horn, Kimballton and surrounding areas about our local pool. As some of you may know, owning and operating a pool is very costly. Chemicals alone run about \$5,000 a year, not including the maintenance needed. This year we are having to repaint the pool (this is done every 6-8 years). The cost of that alone is \$29,640.00! Due to state guidelines, we also must make it ADA Wheelchair accessible (\$2,800) and add a handicapped lift for lowering patrons into the water (\$5,000 to \$7,500). I have been working on grant writing to get our pool house re-constructed (total tear down) to accommodate ADA accessibility, covered bathrooms, and overall update the building from its original layout of 1976. We had an engineer draw up the new proposed plan and that cost was \$356,000. WOW! I thought to myself, there is no way we as a small community (with the smallest operating outdoor pool in Iowa) could afford that. I did contact the company about re-constructing using the existing exterior walls and still waiting for those numbers. Our pool is a huge part of Summer in Elk Horn! Another downfall is finding staff to operate the pool. If we can't safely staff the pool and there comes a season that we wouldn't be able to open in the Summer, is it cost effective to update the pool house? These are the troubles we face within the city, is it worth it? Being the City Clerk, I see the city's financial side of it, but as a resident of Elk Horn with 4 children that use the pool daily, I would LOVE to see it updated. I enjoy donating time helping at the pool because it helps the dollar go farther (I'm a true Dane)! If you want to help, please consider donating to the "Pool House Fund", The goal is to start construction after we close for the 2023 season, which will be here before we know it. Of course, this is if enough funds are raised. Help us make this vision a reality! The City's goal for the patrons is \$100,000.00. Can we do it? YES! All donations big or small are worth saving our pool. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact me!

The idea for the new design is to provide the West half be bathrooms, and the East half for concessions/kitchen with a breezeway in the center of the building to allow a shaded place for patrons to enjoy the shade. (See the attached picture)




